Rather than being disappointed by the prospect of another Easter without a full church lets redouble our commitment to find a deeper relationship with God during the days of Lent knowing that in that new relationship God will bless us.

Church of Ireland Synod: Video celebrates 30 years of women's ordination to priesthood.

WOMEN clergy and ordinands in the Church of Ireland have celebrated 30 years since the ordination of women to the priesthood was introduced, in a video that was shown to the General Synod during its online meeting.

The short film was put together during the lockdown, and features clips of more than 60 women priests receiving a chalice or candle before passing it on off-screen. In the background, the Revd Dr Anne-Marie O'Farrell, a non-stipendiary minister in Dublin who is also a professional musician, plays her own composition on the harp.

Women now make up about 20 per cent of the Church of Ireland's 500 serving clergy. The Church's first female bishop, the Bishop of Meath & Kildare, the Most Revd Pat Storey, was elected in 2013.

Introducing the video to the Synod, **the Archbishop of Armagh**, the Most Revd John McDowell, urged members to reflect on how the ministry of women in Holy Orders had "enriched our witness" and could better shape the Church's mission.

Not enough women are serving in ministry or coming forward for ordination at present, he said: there are significantly fewer than had been hoped for 30 years ago, when the law was changed. "Perhaps the working group headed by the Bishop of Meath will soon help us shed some light on why that is the case," he suggested. "May God prosper the work."

Lent – a good time to deepen your prayer life By the Rev John Tyler.

Lent is a time to take stock of ourselves spiritually. This includes setting aside extra time for prayer. Here are some helpful things to remember as you settle down to it:

People have been praying since Adam had a grandson named Enosh. The Bible tells us (Genesis 4:26) that it was during his days when 'men began to call on the name of the Lord'. They have been doing it ever since.

People have had their prayers answered by God since Genesis, too. But if you want to read some beautiful prayers – and answers to them, browse through the Psalms. Again and again the psalmist writes: "the Lord heard my cry".

So – what do you need to bring to prayer? Just the tiniest amount of faith that God is even there.... Jesus assures us that even faith as big as a tiny mustard seed will be effective.

What gives you the right to come before Almighty God? Jesus does. The Bible is clear that "there is one mediator between God and men, the man Jesus Christ". (1 Timothy 2:5)

The Bible makes clear that God does not stand on ceremony – in fact, He prefers our personal, spontaneous prayers. Jesus was

very matter of fact about it: "When you pray, go into your room, close the door and pray to your Father, who is unseen. Then your Father, who sees what is done in secret, will reward you." (Matthew 6:6)

The Bible assures us that prayer will bring us good things: "we may receive mercy and find grace to help us in our time of need". (Hebrews 4:16)

Above all, prayer must be made with a pure heart. "If I had cherished sin in my heart, the Lord would not have listened." (Psalm 66:18) That simply means that if you know you are doing something wrong, and intend to keep right on doing it, don't waste your time praying.

Finally, what can be the results of your prayers this Lent? Well, here are seven, for starters....

- 1. Joy and deep happiness. (John 16:24)
- 2. Relief from your worry, stress and tension (Philippians 4:6,7)
- 3. Wisdom and more mental clarity (James 1:5,6)
- 4. Protection and deliverance from temptations (Matthew 26:41)
- 5. An ability to share the Good News of Jesus to other people (Matthew 9:38)
- 6. Strength to persevere when you feel under spiritual attack (Ephesians 6:18)

Portstewart's Historical Link with the Royal Air Force

If you wrap up warm and take a walk along the coastal path beside the Old Town Golf Course, just beyond the pumping station and after the fourth hole look towards the sea and you will notice a big concrete arrow on the ground. You might wonder what is that and where did it come from?

Well, having spoken to Mr Harry Cullen who took the initiative to restore this piece of local history, he would like to outline the story.

During the second World War bomber aircraft would fly from the airbase at Aghanloo near Limavady and head out to the North Atlantic to protect the ships carrying people, food supplies, munitions and soldiers to and from Britain. German submarines targeted shipping coming along the North Coast and were sometimes successful in hitting supply ships, some of which remain off Malin Head today, one was loaded with tanks.

The convoys were very vulnerable to attack and the job of the RAF, often using intelligence gathered to locate their whereabouts, was to intercept and destroy the enemy's submarines using depth charges.

The skill of the pilots was paramount. When they left the airbase at Aghanloo in light bombers, they had to make a very steep climb to avoid crashing into Binevenagh mountain. Their course then took them along Portstewart Strand, continuing along the coast making their way to 'The Arrow' to pick up the correct course. The aircraft would have flown very low over the residences in Millbank Road and Portrush Road.

To help set the right path, pontoon barges

were moored off the coast, the planes would drop smoke bombs trying to hit the barges and this manoeuvre would confirm the direction they would need to take. The British Government was also mindful of Ireland's neutrality in the war and were also trying their best not to fly over Irish territorial waters, but in reality, it wasn't big a problem.

Whilst all of this was going on the 'Top Brass' were looking on with binoculars from a high point on the Portrush Road – possibly someone's home? These exercises called 'bomb range indicators' helped the pilots to adjust their sights and thereby give greater accuracy for the direction of flight. The Causeway Coast and Glens Council have agreed to provide an information board early in 2021.

So, with all this local history buried under the rocks and grass, Harry Cullen set about finding volunteers to clear the turf and boulders. Bernard Finlay and a few of the Golf Club greenkeepers set about this heavy, arduous work. 'The Arrow' was originally laid sometime between 1940 and 1942, so it was ready for a bit of TLC!

Having cleared the area to reveal the concrete arrow, it was cleaned and defined clearly with stones which members of the local Scout group brought up from the shore. Finally, Cathal Cunning Chief Marshall from the NW200 team organized a few volunteers to paint the stones white, giving a clear representation of the shape and direction of the Arrow.

The Causeway Coast and Glens Council have agreed to provide an information board early in 2021.




