The Rector writes

In this Magazine I want to be **positive** ... I want to look forward to times when I can share, once again, with friends and family face to face. It's so strange for us, in the Rectory, to have no-one 'over the door' in such a long time. Keeping up with our friends, this year, meant sharing over the phone or over Zoom with all the difficulties that brings, even when half the time our audio was muted! True friends are hard to find and this year we have all relied on them in the days when we felt overburdened under the weight of restrictions.

Flowers and Nature in Easter

I have often wondered about the different flowers and greenery that our talented flower arrangers use to create such lovely displays in church. Even though the physical building of the church is closed, we can only imagine the wonderful displays which would have been for Easter this year. As our thoughts turn to Easter time, I realised that a variety of vegetation, shrubbery, a garden, and flowers either appear along the way or are associated with Easter.

When Jesus arrived, in triumph, at Jerusalem riding on a donkey the people could not roll out a red carpet as we might today for celebrities. Instead, they used palm leaves which were strewn along the way where He passed. The palm branch is a symbol of victory, triumph, peace and eternal life. You should also have received a palm cross with your magazine - a link not just with the palms at Jesus' arrival in Jerusalem but also of His sacrifice and resurrection.

We know that as the following week, Holy Week, unfolded that adulation turned very sour. Jesus became a 'wanted man' and by the Thursday the pressure on Him had mounted so much that he sought solace in a garden. That garden was Gethsemane at the foot of the Mount of Olives in Jerusalem. Probably not manicured or landscaped, but with the cooling shade of olive trees, shrubs and maybe some wild herbs or flowers blooming, perhaps this would have brought peace, silence and a soothing fragrance from the trees and flowers in bloom. Some researchers believe that some of the roots of the oldest olive trees there today could date back two thousand years to the time when Jesus was there.

By Friday things had turned very ugly and after His trial, in a gesture of mockery and scorn, some Roman soldiers put local thorny shrubs to use making a circlet to form a crown. This they jammed onto Jesus' head drawing not only blood, but a brutal and humiliating contrast with the laurel wreaths that Roman Emperors wore. In their warped way they thought this was apt for the 'King of the Jews'.

There have been other links with Christian traditions, for example Bird's Eye Speedwell, these are small flowers of an intense blue and are also known by their Latin name *Veronica chamaedrys*. The Latin name refers to Saint Veronica, the woman who gave Jesus her veil to wipe his face while he was carrying the cross on the way to crucifixion.

A rose with 5 petals symbolizes the 5 wounds of Christ inflicted on Him during His crucifixion, the colour of the rose is also significant – a white rose represents Christ's purity and a red rose His sacrificial blood.

The flower which represents Easter Day is the white lily or Easter Lily. The single flower stem originating from a single bulb in the ground is a symbol of Christ's resurrection from the tomb. The trumpet shaped flower represents a trumpet sounding the message that 'Jesus has Risen!' This flower represents love and hope.

So, looking at nature we can see a lot of Easter symbolism in God's creation and certainly here in the northern hemisphere, when we look to nature at Easter time, we see the signs of resurrection of the natural world after the deadness of winter.

Leave your dandelions alone

When mowing your lawn, avoid cutting your dandelions. That is the advice of the president of the British Ecological Society, Prof Jane Memmott. It will help to save the bees.

She explains: "Dandelions are a fantastic source of pollen and nectar for the early pollinators in particular. If they were rare, people would be fighting over them, but because they're common, people pull them out and spray them with all sorts of horrible things when they should just let them flower. If you leave the lawn to three or four inches, then dandelions, clover and daisies can flower and then you end with something like a tapestry, and it's much nicer to sit there and watch the insects buzzing about."

Prof Memmott encourages everyone to get a bee hotel for their garden. "There's nothing nicer than sitting in a chair with a glass of wine and watching the bees going in and out of your own personal little beehive. Even just a potted plant on a doorstep will provide lunch for a bee or a fly or a butterfly."

Why Easter will never go away

How do you make sense of the Resurrection? Dead men don't rise, so why believe that this particular dead man *did* rise?

At the end of St Luke's gospel we read that: "they still did not believe it because of joy and amazement" (Luke 24.4). This is highly significant. The Gospels do not show us a group of disciples who were in a receptive frame of mind. After the crucifixion, they were in hiding, frightened and scattered. Then suddenly, they came out of hiding and were totally different; excited, joyful. By Pentecost they were confident, with one firm message: 'You crucified Jesus, but God raised Him up!'

How did they know this? Because of direct personal experience. Some of them had visited the tomb of Jesus: it was empty. Others claimed to have seen and touched the risen Lord. Were they hallucinating? People can hallucinate in groups – when taking drugs, for example. But of course, each one will see a different hallucination. But the disciples all saw the same thing. Or rather, the same person. Jesus.

Were they lying? Jesus had died a humiliating death as a criminal. Perhaps they wanted to rescue His good name. So, did they pretend they had seen Him?

This theory has a big problem. Their preaching led them into trouble with the authorities. They were beaten and imprisoned and some of them killed. People will die for ideas and causes which they believe in passionately. But not for things they have made up. We might suffer for our convictions, but we will not suffer for our inventions.

What about the 'swoon' theory? That Jesus didn't die on the cross, despite terrible wounds? That He recovered in the tomb, and then escaped? That the disciples nursed Him back to

health? But Roman soldiers knew when a man was dead; and there was the guard on the tomb. Also, the events which followed simply don't fit. If the disciples had been hiding Jesus all along, they would have kept very low-key, and out of the way, so that the authorities did not come after Him again.

Besides, to preach that God had raised Jesus from the dead – which is exactly what they did preach – would have been a lie. Beatings and threat of death would soon have loosened their tongues. Inventions crumble under pressure; convictions hold fast.

Another reason for believing in the Resurrection is this: Jesus' continuing impact. Thousands and soon millions of people in every generation since have shared an inescapable sense of being 'accompanied' through life. Though unseen, they identify this presence as the Risen Lord.

Sometimes this experience of meeting Jesus is gentle and fitful. Sometimes it is dramatic and life changing. This reminds us that the resurrection of Jesus is not just an interesting historical puzzle. It is a vital, present day reality. It brings wonderful comfort, assuring us of the central Christian truths: death is dead; Jesus is alive; God is love.

This central notion was captured, most movingly, by the great Albert Schweitzer: 'He came to those men who knew Him not. He speaks to us the same word: "Follow thou me," and sets us to the tasks which He has to fulfil for our time. He commands. And to those who obey Him, whether they be wise or simple, He will reveal Himself in the toils, the conflicts, the suffering which they shall pass through in His fellowship, and, as ineffable mystery, they shall learn in their own experience who He is.'

Have a joyful - and a challenging - Easter.
